What's New...EYLF Version 2.0

You may have noticed that educators at NKCC use a Framework to interpret learning and set goals: this frame work is called the Early Years Learning Framework which has recently been updated. The Early Years Learning Framework has a structure provided by three key elements – **Principles, Practices and Learning Outcomes**. These help us to reflect about our work, to appropriately plan our programs for children and guide us on how we work with children, their families and our community.

Learning Outcomes - Learning Outcomes encourages childcare professionals to focus on what children can do as well as supports and guides individual learning programs for children. It provides goals or achievements which can be used to identify a child's progression through any experience they are engaged in. There are five main Learning Outcomes:

- Learning Outcome 1 Identity: Children have a strong sense of identity
- Learning Outcome 2 Community: Children are connected with and contribute to their world
- Learning Outcome 3 Wellbeing: Children have a strong sense of wellbeing
- Learning Outcome 4 Learning: Children are confident and involved learners
- Learning Outcome 5 Communication: Children are effective communicators

Principles - relates to our beliefs and values. The Early Years Learning Framework provides us with Principles to guide us in our work with children and focuses on assisting each individual child to make progress towards the Learning Outcomes. The eight principles are the following –

- Secure, respectful and reciprocal relationships
- Partnerships
- Respect for diversity
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander perspectives
- Equity, inclusion and high expectations
- Sustainability
- Critical reflection and ongoing professional learning
- Collaborative leadership and teamwork

Practices - relates to how we put our Principles into action by working together with children, their families and within our community. The Early Years Learning Framework promotes children's learning by drawing upon a repertoire of pedagogical practices (using our skills and knowledge that enable us to help children to learn) through –

- Holistic, integrated and interconnected approaches
- Responsiveness to children
- Planning and implementing Play based learning with intentionality
- Creating physical, temporal, intellectual, social and emotional environments
- Valuing the cultural and social contexts of children & their families
- Providing for continuity in experiences and enabling effective transitions
- Analysing, assessing, monitoring and evaluating children's learning, development and wellbeing to understand, acknowledge and document children's progress



As the weather is getting colder, we ask parents to bring your child's beanie, warm jacket and spare set of warm clothes. During Autumn and Winter, we still take the children outside to play and explore the environment. It is very important that children have the appropriate clothing that helps them keep warm during this time.

The Most Common Winter Myth Dispelled

"My child will get sick if they play outdoors in the cold"

Most adults associate Winter with getting colds and illnesses such as the flu. However, it is not exposure to the cold that cause these viruses. In fact, it's likely to be increased exposure to poorly ventilated indoor environments, where bacteria and viruses live. By encouraging outdoor play in winter, children gain much needed exposure to fresh air and Vitamin D, while avoiding bacteria.

We have been focusing on the children's motor skills by providing a variety of physical activities such as; walking on the balance beam, climbing, crawling through a tunnel and sensory activities. The Autumn weather has been great for outdoor play and the children have been connecting to their natural environment. They have been showing their interest in music and reading books so we have also provided a lot of story and music time using puppets. We also had a Music Incursion held by Mini Monstars which will be an ongoing part of our monthly program and the children loved participating in this musical incursion.

Quick Reminders:

- Remember to pack more than one set of clothing. This includes; socks, pants, t-shirts or long sleeves and a weather appropriate jacket/jumper.
- If your child is starting to walk or does walk please be pack appropriate closed-toe shoes as these will help to protect their feet when outside and inside.
 - As the colder months have approached please make sure to also pack thick winter jackets, jumpers and beanies so the children can continue to enjoy exploring their outdoor environment while staying warm.

Butterfly Room Term 2 Newsletter 2023

Welcome to Term 2 in the Butterfly Room, we have had quite a busy Term celebrating lots of different cultural events with the children and learning lots of new things. We have celebrated and learnt about School Clean-up Day, Harmony Week, Persian New Year, Easter, Orthodox Easter, Nature Play Week, Eid-Al-Fitr and ANZAC day. To celebrate all these special and meaningful events the children participated in various experiences for e.g. sensory walks, leaf painting, creating stencils, sandpit treasure hunt, moon and star cutting and pasting and lots more. The children have liked all the arts and craft activities as they enjoy spending lots of time at the art table expressing their imaginations and creativity.

We look forward to celebrating and learning about the following events as our Term 2 Curriculum continues: Road Safety Week, National Reconciliation Week, World Environment Day as well as taking part in some exciting incursions...so stay tuned!

At the start of April, we said goodbye to our Kinder Teacher Sarah who we miss lots; we wished her all the best as she takes some time off for herself.

As part of our Term Goal we have been focusing on our different feelings and talking a lot through our group times about how we're feeling and what those feelings are. The way we have been learning about this is listening to "When I'm feeling..." books by Trace Moroney. The children are enjoying listening to these different emotion books and then discussing how it makes us feel. Each week we focus on a new feeling, if we think everyone is understanding the feelings we have been learning about we then move onto the next. In May we have been learning about the feeling of 'angry' and how it makes us feel. Grayson refers to it as feeling like a volcano in his tummy just like the book says. We have been discussing how it is okay to feel these different emotions and how we can deal with these emotions.

Reminders

- Now that we are entering our colder months of the year we do ask for parents to bring in beanies, winter coats/jackets for their child as we do continue to go outside given the weather isn't too windy or raining.
- Change of clothes please be remembering to pack more than <u>one</u> spare change of clothing in your child's bag in case of accidents throughout the day and if they get wet from water play or being outside and getting their clothes dirty. This includes: socks, pants, t-shirts/long sleeves, undies, shoes and jumpers/jackets.

We kindly ask for all belongings such as; drink bottles and clothes to all be labelled with your child's name on them so we know whose they are. Sometimes we have reliever staff in the room and they aren't sure whose drink bottle belongs to which child.
